COMPUTER INFORMATION SYSTEMS (CIS) 1 & 2

April

CIS1 students are developing a deeper understanding of software as the students are now installing Windows and Linux operating systems on the computers they have been building. This also helps them to differentiate between primary and secondary storage. The students continue to learn how to apply their troubleshooting algorithms (abstraction) to real world experiences. We will be spending more time this month utilizing abstractions to solve hardware problems with the different tools that come with the OS software.

CIS2 continues on with the IP camera project; they have received and updated the new switch. They have gone through the application layer of the OSI model and done a basic review of the initial switching configurations. This month we are going deeper into switching concepts. The students will become more familiar with the frame structure and how to tag



the frames to control the flow of the packet switched network at layer 2 of the OSI model.

May

CIS1 did great going through a mock interview with the heads of IT hiring for Highland Community College, Freeport Health Network, and University of Wisconsin-Health. They also got into the Linux- and Unix-type operating systems. This month they are preparing for their A+certifications. They are also going to be working on scripting tools for automation and management. Finally they will finish up the semester with best practices for data handling.

CIS2 students are getting ready for their Network+ final and for OCED290 final. This past month they ran five ceiling drops for the new IP camera architecture they took part in designing for the St. John Church's 360-degree coverage. Last week they did well going through a mock interview with the heads of IT hiring for HCC, FHN, and UW-Health. They are in the process of setting up summer internships.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE 1 & 2

Criminal Justice Year 1

This semester students in the first year of the Criminal Justice program are learning about the historical development of the correctional system in the United States. They explored the evolution and philosophy of punishment, relevant matters of constitutional law, the death penalty, community corrections, and rehabilitation practices in both institutional and noninstitutional environments. We continue to explore current events that impact the criminal justice system and society.

In addition, students took an indepth look at cyber security focusing on security needs, network systems, recommended safeguard solutions, management of security devices, and procedures. They explored topics of computer forensics, cryptography; applicable law and regulations; risk assessment and policy analysis; investigation techniques; issues related to privacy; terrorism; hacktivism; the a motivational fire within her. as dark web; and more. This semester we were able to complete some hands-on learning activities, process a correctional-inspired mock crime scene, and apply skills with the Use-of-Force Simulator.

Criminal Justice 1 Outstanding Student Award: Sylvia Schnoor Sylvia is simply a remarkable student who is full of energy and



truly applies herself in every class activity. Sylvia is often the first student in the classroom and is quick to engage in conversation about criminal justice topics. Criminal Justice Year 2

Dual credit students in the second year of Criminal Justice are examining juvenile delinquency. They explored the



history of the juvenile justice system, frequency of juvenile crime, substance abuse, peers and gangs, education, family dynamics, school violence, police practices, juvenile correctional practices, and more. Students also took an in-depth look at school shootings in America.

CareerTEC second-year students also completed courses in First Aid and Physical Fitness as a part of the program this

year. Students also took part in numerous hands-on activities. processed some crimes scenes, applied skills on the Use-of-Force simulator, and discussed current events regularly.

HEALTH OCCUPATIONS YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP 2

April

The HOYA 2 students are on the downhill slide before they reach the ultimate goal post of high school graduation!! They are keeping extremely busy and avoiding the plague of "senioritis." I am confident that these young adults will maintain their focus even as the weather gets warmer and graduation creeps closer.

HOYA 2 will continue to use their critical thinking skills by doing situational assignments where they interact as CNAs and potential healthcare professionals via their online workbook. This allows a much more accurate illustration of what they can expect as they progress through their career paths.

A few of the student group have completed their Leadership/ Teaching assignments. They worked with local elementary teachers and educated students in the fifth grade or lower on a healthcare subject (below right).

So far, students have taught proper teeth brushing and cardiovascular system. The younger generation of future HOYA students were taught where their radial pulse was located. They were also taught how exercise affects their heart rate by completing 30 seconds of jumping jacks and measuring





their heart rate via their radial pulse. The remaining groups will complete the Leadership/ Teaching assignment this month.

As teaching others is extremely important in any healthcare provider's profession, our students are working diligently on their team teaching projects to encompass the Medical Terminology of body systems this semester. These lessons include the pathology of specific disease processes, medical specialties and diagnostic tools that deal with those processes, as well as looking into some rare diseases they may encounter. The



students have found some interactive games to help with these teaching projects.

The students are down to the last hours of their senior year. It has been such a delight to watch each of them grow this year.

They have battled with their next steps in life; choosing a

college isn't the easiest thing to do as a senior. The College Choice research project opened their eyes to the pros and cons of each university. I believe they have made amazing choices for their next career step.

They have worked diligently at their internships while maintaining their school life as well as their social life. While each student is required 288 hours per year for this course, several students have over 500 hours! Some have changed their career choice as they undertook their internships, finding a passion that will lead them into the next step of their lives.

Coon secures scholarship

CareerTEC is proud to announce Ryan Coon as the 2023-24 Karen Johnson Scholarship winner.

Coon is a Freeport High School senior in the Careers in Business 1 program. Coon will receive a \$300 scholarship upon submission of his first semester grades from Augustana College, where Coon is attending this fall to major in business administration and minor in finance.



Coon will receive his scholarship certificate Thursday, May 16 at Freeport's Convocation Program in the Jeannette Lloyd Theatre in Freeport.

The Karen Johnson Scholarship is awarded each year to a student who demonstrates determination in the pursuit of career goals initiated through a CareerTEC program. It was always Johnson's hope that the student receiving this award would be as successful in the career path they have chosen as they had been at CareerTEC. Johnson was a past director of CareerTEC.

In addition to applying for the Karen Johnson Scholarship, Coon was nominated as the Outstanding CIB 1 student by CareerTEC instructor Elizabeth Hazzard. He and all outstanding students earned a \$25 cash award and certificate for being honored by their instructors.

At the time of his application. Coon had a 4.053 GPA on a 4.0 scale and ranked 16th in his class of 207 seniors. He has received the Presidential Scholarship from Augustana College.

Coon is an Illinois State Scholar. was named NIC-10 Academic All-Conference, and was a member of the National Honor Society and student council. In addition to playing football for three years, Coon was a talented baseball player over the past four years for the Pretzels.
